The Beginning of GCA

Gaston Community Action, Inc. is a private non-profit corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina to operate anti-poverty programs in Gaston County on October 22, 1964. Structured in accordance with standards and requirements of the federal Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 and subsequence amendments, "the basic purpose of community action is to stimulate a better focusing of all available local, state, private, and federal sources upon the goals of enabling low-income families and low-income individuals to obtain skills, knowledge, and motivations, and secure the opportunities for them to become fully self-sufficient"

Agency Overview

The agency administers programs in Cleveland, Gaston, Lincoln and Stanly Counties. Funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and Human Services Administration for Children and Families, North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services of Economic Opportunity. GCA employs a staff of about 120 and operates on an annual budget of over 6 million.

GCA has continuously provided services and advocacy on behalf of the poor and disadvantage since its inception and charter. Our programs are planned after holding public hearings to solicit community input. Head Start educates 460 preschool children in Gaston and Lincoln Counties. The CSBG program is directed toward making low-income residents of the four counties self-sufficient by providing help with employment, housing, education and transportation.

Gaston Community Action, Inc. is committed and dedicated to ensure the Head Start children will be prepared to succeed in school and life. The Gaston Community Action School Readiness team is comprised of parents, staff, community partners, and the local school systems. The responsibility of the team is to make certain the school readiness goals align with the Head Start Early Learning Framework, the North Carolina Early Learning Guidelines and the local school system expectations. We will focus on implementing projects and activities that bring about the most efficient use of resources that will positively influence the lives and environment of the children and families we serve.

Each Head Start agency shall make available to the public a report published at least once in each fiscal year that discloses the following information from the most recently concluded fiscal year, except that reporting such information shall not reveal personally identifiable information about an individual child or parent:

- The total amount of public and private funds received and the amount from each source
- An explanation of budgetary expenditures and proposed budget for the fiscal year
- The total number of children and families served, the average monthly enrollment
- The percentage of enrolled children that received medical and dental exams
- Information about parent engagement activities
- The agency's efforts to prepare children for kindergarten
- Any other information required by the Secretary
- Implementing School Readiness goals for preschoolers



GCA'S APPROACH TO SCHOOL READINESS GOALS FOR CHILDREN

Head Start defines school readiness as children possessing the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for success in school, for later learning and life. The Head Start approach to school readiness means that children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and schools are ready for children.

Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start is committed to ensuring that children who leave our Head Start program are prepared when they enter the kindergarten program in the public schools. The teaching staff use various strategies including the CLASS observation tool to enhance best practice to ensure all children enrolled are working toward meeting goals in all domain areas. These domain areas are assessed daily. The five essential domains are:

- Approaches to Learning and Play
- Social-Emotional Development
- Cognition and General Knowledge
- Language Development and Literacy Knowledge and Skills
- Physical and Health Development

With the implementation of these domains GCA HS will ensure that children (including those with disabilities) are fully equipped with the necessary skills to successfully transition to kindergarten. The training and mentoring of teaching staff is critical in meeting school readiness goals. Parents are included in goal setting in order to help the child's progress.

Financial Audit Results: For the year ended June 30, 2015, the auditor issued an unqualified opinion. There were no financial statement findings and no questioned costs.


NUMBER OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES SERVED


Our Children

Gaston Community Action, Inc.'s Head Start is funded through the Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, Office of Head Start. Our funded enrollment is 460 children. Children who leave the program are replaced by those on a waiting list. Our average daily attendance for 2015 was 96%.

Our Families

Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start served 524 families. 339 are single-parent families; 147 are twoparent families; 33 are homeless and 5 foster families.







PARENT ENGAGEMENT/MALE ENGAGEMENT

Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start strongly encourages parent participation. Parents are their child's first teachers, and are the key to the design and success of the program. Parents are encouraged to participate in a variety of activities, including:

- Parent/staff meetings and trainings
- Policy Council meetings
- Parent-Teacher Conferences
- Home Visits
- Classroom volunteer
- Parent/Staff Trainings held monthly
- Special Programs for male involvement

The program provides newsletters and a monthly calendar to parents that include upcoming events. The menus are posted weekly, breakfast, lunch, and snack. The center news and other items of interest are also posted on the parent information board.

TRANSITION TO KINDERGARTEN

Preparing Children for Kindergarten

245 children transitioned to Kindergarten in May 2016. Transition meetings are held in April of every year to assist parents of children who are moving on to kindergarten. A tour of the local public school is scheduled to familiarize the families of the setting and routines; parents are opportunities given to ask questions of kindergarten teachers. Parents are encouraged participate in transition activities. Transition documentation containing all health developmental and educational information will follow the child to their assigned school.

Collaboration Agreements

Gaston Community Action, Inc. collaborates with two LEA's (Gaston and Lincoln) in our service area. These agreements help coordinate disability services for children who required needed services from these local school systems.

PROGRAM NOTICE AWARD FOR FIVE YEAR HEAD START PROJECT PERIODS

The Office of Head Start (OHS) moving from indefinite project periods to five year project periods for all Head Start grantees. This requires OHS funding changes on practices and oversight of Head Start Programs. Changes oversight will include in communication improved between federal staff and grantees, as well as ongoing analysis of data to determine the type of support needed by grantees. The main purpose of improved oversight is demonstrate the quality of services. the program effectiveness of management systems, and the achievement of outcomes for children, families. and communities. This is our agency's third (3) year of the five (5) year period. We expected and received our third (3) monitoring visit. The

visits were for Health and Safety; ERSEA and Fiscal. We passed these monitoring reviews without any problems.

OHS APPROACH TO SCHOOL READINESS FOR GCA'S HEAD START PROGRAM

The Head Start School Readiness encompasses three frameworks major that promote an understanding of school readiness for parents families. and The three frameworks provide the foundation for implementing a and integrated systemic comprehensive child development service including family engagement. Grantees must participate in school readiness progress meetings with OHS.





MEDICAL AND DENTAL

Medical Homes

97% of enrolled children have an ongoing source of continuous, accessible health care. 3% are eligible to receive medical services through child care insurance.

94% of children are enrolled in Medicaid 6% are enrolled in health private insurance plans. Head Start works cooperatively through both County Health Departments and our Nutrition Consultant to perform heights, weights, blood pressure, dental screening, fluoride varnish, blood lead screenings, and review of immunization records.

Dental Exams

97% enrolled children have continuous, accessible dental care.

Nutrition

Menus are provided in English and Spanish for parents and public review.

We participate in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). During our school year we serve approximately 218,501 meals to children at a cost of \$617,200.

2015-2016 Outcomes

Through collaborative efforts with community partners, GCA works to improve the social and economic well-being of individuals and families in Gaston, Lincoln, Cleveland and Stanly counties in North Carolina. Tasked by the State to aid in the reduction of citizens who are living in poverty, GCA operates the Total Family Achievement Program (TFAP) with funds provided through the Community Service Block Grant (CSBG). Clients learn about new possibilities for themselves and their families. They begin to see themselves as someone who can make a difference for their family as a member of their community. The TFAP promotes self-sufficiency by providing help with setting a household budgets, rent, food, housing, and transportation assistance along with education/ training and job search and support, but first their immediate needs are focused on assistance in order to give them some relief from the pressure to survive. Clients must sign a contract to adhere to the program's guidelines to walk forward self-sufficiency.

The number of families enrolled from July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2016 was 205, which represent 545 family members being served.















lient was accepted into program with a criminal record, living in a house that provides drug and alcohol dependency treatment, no transportation and working through a temp agency. He has many job skills such as truck driving, brick masonry, construction and machinery. Due to receiving several DUIs that require jail time, client has struggling to secure permanent employment. His outstanding medical bills had judgements on his credit record causing a denied of rental property.

Client was referred to NCWORKS where he received assistance with completing a resume' and applying online for employment. Full-time employment was gained earning \$10.00 hour and a 40 hour work week with benefits as a forklift driver. He actually completed his jail sentence while being allowed work release during the day and sleeping at the jail at night. CSBG funds paid past due medical bills and provided bus tickets for client. He is still wanting to get much needed dental work done, but does not want to miss pay from work. He opened a bank account, secured housing at a motel with another coworker that is within walking distance of his job. He continues to maintained attendance with AA meetings at least four times a week. New Family Income: \$20,784.00
