The Beginning of GCA

Gaston Community Action, Inc. is a private non-profit corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina to operate anti-poverty programs in Gaston County on October 22, 1964. Structured in accordance with standards and requirements of the federal Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 and subsequence amendments, "the basic purpose of community action is to stimulate a better focusing of all available local, state, private, and federal sources upon the goals of enabling low-income families and low-income individuals to obtain skills, knowledge, and motivations, and secure the opportunities for them to become fully self-sufficient"

Agency Overview

The agency administers programs in Cleveland, Gaston, Lincoln and Stanly Counties. Funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and Human Services Administration for Children and Families, North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services of Economic Opportunity. GCA employs a staff of about 120 and operates on an annual budget of over 6 million.

GCA has continuously provided services and advocacy on behalf of the poor and disadvantage since its inception and charter. Our programs are planned after holding public hearings to solicit community input. Head Start educates 431 preschool children in Gaston and Lincoln Counties. The CSBG program is directed toward making low-income residents of the four counties self-sufficient by providing help with employment, housing, education and transportation.

This report is prepared to comply with the reauthorized Head Start Act of 2007. This Act, specifically Section 644 (a) (2) (B), and states:

Gaston Community Action, Inc. is committed and dedicated to ensure the Head Start children will be prepared to succeed in school and life. The Gaston Community Action School Readiness team is comprised of parents, staff, community partners, and the local school systems. The responsibility of the team is to make certain the school readiness goals align with the Head Start Early Learning Framework, the North Carolina Early Learning Guidelines and the local school system expectations. We will focus on implementing projects and activities that bring about the most efficient use of resources that will positively influence the lives and environment of the children and families we serve.

Each Head Start agency shall make available to the public a report published at least once in each fiscal year that discloses the following information from the most recently concluded fiscal year, except that reporting such information shall not reveal personally identifiable information about an individual child or parent:

- The total amount of public and private funds received and the amount from each source
- An explanation of budgetary expenditures and proposed budget for the fiscal year
- The total number of children and families served, the average monthly enrollment
- The percentage of enrolled children that received medical and dental exams
- Information about parent engagement activities
- The agency's efforts to prepare children for kindergarten
- Implementing School Readiness goals for preschoolers



GCA'S APPROACH TO SCHOOL READINESS GOALS FOR CHILDREN

Head Start defines school readiness as children possessing the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for success in school, for later learning and life. The Head Start approach to school readiness means that children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and schools are ready for children.

Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start is committed to ensuring that children who leave our Head Start program are prepared when they enter the kindergarten program in the public schools. The teaching staff use various strategies including the Classroom Learning Assessment System (CLASS) observation tool to enhance best practice to ensure all children enrolled are working toward meeting goals in all domain areas. These domain areas are assessed daily. The five essential domains are:

- Approaches to Learning and Play
- Social-Emotional Development
- Cognition and General Knowledge
- Language Development and Literacy Knowledge and Skills
- Physical and Health Development

With the implementation of these domains GCA HS will ensure that children (including those with disabilities) are fully equipped with the necessary skills to successfully transition to kindergarten. The training and mentoring of teaching staff is critical in meeting school readiness goals. Parents are included in goal setting in order to help the child's progress.


Financial Audit Results: For the year ended June 30, 2019, the auditor issued an unmodified opinion. There were no financial statement findings and no questioned costs.

PARENT ENGAGEMENT/MALE ENGAGEMENT

Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start strongly encourages parent participation. Parents are their child's first teachers, and are the key to the design and success of the program. Parents are encouraged to participate in a variety of activities, including:

- Parent/staff meetings and trainings
- Policy Council meetings
- Parent-Teacher Conferences
- Home Visits
- Classroom volunteer
- Parent/Staff Trainings held monthly
- Special Programs for male involvement

The program provides newsletters and a monthly calendar to parents that include upcoming events. The menus are posted weekly, breakfast, lunch, and snack. The center news and other items of interest are also posted on the parent information board

TRANSITION TO KINDERGARTEN

Preparing Children for Kindergarten

270 children transitioned to Kindergarten in May 2019. Transition meetings are held in April of every year to assist parents of children who are moving on to kindergarten. Tours of the local public and charter schools are scheduled to familiarize the families of the setting, routines, and make choices. Parents are given opportunities to ask questions of kindergarten teachers and school administration. Parents are encouraged to participate in transition activities. Transition includes sending documentation containing all the health developmental and educational information for the child to their assigned school.

Collaboration Agreements

Gaston Community Action, Inc. collaborates with two LEA's (Gaston and Lincoln) in our service area. These agreements help coordinate disability services for children who required needed services from these local school systems.

PROGRAM NOTICE AWARD FOR FIVE YEAR HEAD START PROJECT PERIODS

The Office of Head Start (OHS) moving from indefinite is project periods to five year project periods for all Head Start grantees. This requires changes on OHS funding practices and oversight of Head Start Programs. Changes oversight will include in improved communication between federal staff and grantees, as well as ongoing analysis of data to determine the type of support needed by grantees. Funding through the Office of Economic Opportunity enabled GCA to operate the federal Community Services Block Grant Program (CSBG) in the form of the Total Family Assistance Program (TFAP). The CSBG grant provides funds to alleviate the causes and conditions of poverty in communities.


GCA's TFAP promotes self-sufficiency by providing services to meet individual needs such as employment, housing, and crisis prevention through collaboration with community partners in the counties we serve, Gaston, Lincoln, Cleveland, and Stanly. The program carries out activities that enables low-income families to move out of poverty. The number of families enrolled in the program from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020 was 139, resulting in 403 individuals benefiting from services provided.






Community Service Block Grant (CSBG) Demographic Synopsis









SOURCE OF INCOME


















Success Story!

A single male living in his vehicle, 46 years old, a felon with no family members living within Gastonia with yearly income of \$9,997 was enrolled in the TFAP. He earned his GED while in prison. On December 7, 2019 he began working as a temporary employee at Amazon earning \$15 an hour with no benefits. He had been unsuccessful in securing housing due to his criminal background and bad credit history. Meanwhile, his girlfriend was living in Charlotte in a home for women with newborns and had been recently released from prison. He wanted to be responsible for her and their newborn child, so he started paying for hotel rooms.

Housing was secured for client by partnering with a landlord who sometimes house individuals with criminal backgrounds and poor credit. Using CSBG funds his deposit and the first month's rent was paid to secure housing enabling him to secure visitation with his baby. He was also assisted with the purchase of household needs and groceries in the absence of food stamps. With this assistance he was able to save money for his upcoming rent and utilities.

On March 1, 2020 he gained permanent job status with Amazon still earning \$15.00 an hour, which placed him over the poverty guideline, with employee health care coverage, employee time off with pay, and with an employee retirement plan. His new yearly income, \$31,176.
