GASTON COMMUNITY ACTION, INC.

Gaston Community Action, Inc. is a private non-profit corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina to operate anti-poverty programs in Gaston County on October 22, 1964. Structured in accordance with standards and requirements of the federal Economic Opportunity Act of 1964 and subsequent amendments, "the basic purpose of community action is to stimulate a better focusing of all available local, state, private, and federal sources upon the goals of enabling low-income families and low-income individuals to obtain skills, knowledge, and motivations, and secure the opportunities for them to become fully self-sufficient".

The agency administers programs in Gaston, Lincoln, Stanly and Cleveland Counties funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families, North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services Office of Economic Opportunity, North Carolina Department of Public Instruction, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture. GCA employs a staff of about 126 and operates on an annual budget of over 7 million.

GCA has continuously provided services and advocacy on behalf of the poor and disadvantaged since its inception and charter. Our programs are planned after holding public hearings to solicit community input. Head Start educates 460 preschool children in Gaston and Lincoln Counties. The CSBG program is directed toward making low-income residents of the four counties self-sufficient by providing help with employment, housing, education and transportation. The Weatherization program installs permanent insulating materials in homes of the elderly, handicapped, and low-income persons.

The Board of Directors is comprised of 16 members representing three sectors: Public (appointed by the county commissioners), Citizen (elected by the low-income residents), and Private (appointed by civic groups).



This report is prepared to comply with the reauthorized Head Start Act of 2007. This Act, specifically Section 644 (a) (2) (B), and states:

Gaston Community Action, Inc. is committed and dedicated to ensure the Head Start will be prepare to succeed in school and life. Gaston Community Action School Readiness team, which is comprised of parents, staff, community partners, and the local school systems, will work to make certain the School Readiness Goals aligned with Head Start Early Learning Framework, the North Carolina Early Learning Guidelines and the local school system expectations. We will focus on implementing projects and activities that bring about the most efficient use of resources that will positively influence the lives and environment of the children and families we serve.

Each Head Start agency shall make available to the public a report published at least once in each fiscal year that disclosed the following information from the most recently concluded fiscal year, except that reporting such information shall not reveal personally identifiable information about an individual child or parent:

- The total amount of public and private funds received and the amount from each source.
- An explanation of budgetary expenditures and proposed budget for the fiscal year.
- The total number of children and families served, the average monthly enrollment (as a percentage of funded enrollment), and the percentage of eligible children served.
- The results of the most recent review by the Secretary and the financial audit.
- The percentage of enrolled children that received medical and dental exams.
- Information about parent engagement involvement activities.
- The agency's efforts to prepare children for kindergarten.
- Any other information required by the Secretary.
- Intuiting School Readiness Goals for preschoolers.
- Total number of meals served an its cost to the program
- Notice of 5 years award.



GCA'S APPROACH TO SCHOOL READINESS GOALS FOR CHILDREN

Head Start defines school readiness as children possessing the skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary for success in school and for later learning and life. The Head Start approach to school readiness means that children are ready for school, families are ready to support their children's learning, and schools are ready for children.

Gaston Community Action School Readiness goals depict the knowledge and skills for all children to be successful in school and life. Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start is committed to ensuring that children who leave our Head Start program are prepared when they enter the kindergarten program in the public schools by aligning with Head Start Child Development and Early Learning Framework, North Carolina Early Learning Guidelines, and local school systems. The five essential domains are:

- Approaches to Learning and Play
- Social-Emotional Development
- Cognition and General Knowledge
- Language Development and Literacy Knowledge and Skills
- Physical and Health Development

With the implementation of these domains GCA HS will ensure that children (including those with disabilities) and families serve are fully equipped with necessary skills to successfully transition to kindergarten.

- Employs 93 employees
- Contracts with local agencies to provide preventive health, nutrition, disabilities services and mental health services to children and families.
- Operates 7 Head Start Centers (3 in Lincoln County 4 in Gaston County)
- Serves children 3 and 4 years of age with birth date by August 31 of that year.
- Operates four (4) NC Pre-K classrooms two (2) Rankin I Head Start center 714 Rankin Ave, Gastonia, NC 28053 two (2) Lincoln Park Head Start Center 140 Industrial Park Rd., Lincolnton, NC 28092
- Serves children Breakfast, Lunch and PM Snack
- Operates 8:00 AM 2:00 PM each day in conjunction with Gaston and Lincoln's school calendars.
- Enrollment is 460 at all times. Children who drop/add are adjusted daily.


NUMBER OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES SERVED

Our Children

Gaston Community Action, Inc.'s Head Start is funded through the Department of Health and Human Services, Administration for Children and Families, Office of Head Start. Our funded enrollment is 460 children. Children who leave the program are replaced by those on a waiting list. Our average Daily Attendance for 2013 was 93%. We served 476 children.

Our Families

Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start served 447 families. 323 are single-parent families; 119 are two-parent families; foster children .5



PROGRAM NOTICE AWARD FOR FIVE YEAR HEAD START PROJECT PERIODS

The Office of Head Start (OHS) is moving from indefinite project periods to five year project periods for all Head Start grantees. This requires changes on OHS funding practices and oversight of Head Start Programs. Changes in oversight will include improved communication between federal staff and grantees, as well as ongoing analysis of data to determine the type of support needed by grantees. The main purpose of improved oversight is to demonstrate the quality of program services, the effectiveness of management systems, and the achievement of outcomes for children, families, and communities. This is our agency's first (1) year of the five (5) year period. We expect our first (1) monitoring visit this year.

OHS APPROACH TO SCHOOL READINESS FOR GCA'S HEAD START PROGRAM

The Head Start School Readiness encompasses three major frameworks that promote an understanding of school readiness for parents and families, infants and toddlers, and preschoolers. The three frameworks provide the foundation for implementing systemic and integrated comprehensive child development services and family engagement efforts that lead to school readiness for young children and families. Grantees must participate in school readiness progress meetings with OHS.

MEDICAL AND DENTAL

Medical Homes

94% of enrolled children have an ongoing source of continuous, accessible health care. 6% are eligible to receive medical services through child care insurance. 92% of children are enrolled in Medicaid. 10% are enrolled in private health insurance plans. Head Start works cooperatively through both County Health Department and our Nutrition Consultant to perform heights, weights, blood pressure, dental screening and fluoride varnish, blood lead screenings, and review of immunization records.

Dental Exams

96% enrolled children have continuous, accessible dental care.

PARENT ENGAGEMENT/MALE ENGAGEMENT

Gaston Community Action, Inc. Head Start strongly encourages parent participation. Parents are their child's first teachers, and are the key to the design and success. Parents participate, and are encouraged to participate, in a variety of activities, including:

- Parent/staff meetings and trainings
- Policy Council meetings
- •Parent-Teacher Conferences
- Home Visits
- •Special program events celebrating historical holidays
- •Field Trips
- •Classroom volunteer
- •Parent/Staff Trainings held monthly
- •Special Program for males of the program

The program provides newsletters and a monthly calendar flyer to parents that include upcoming events. They are also provided the weekly, breakfast, lunch, and snack menus, classroom news, and other items of interest on each center parent information board

TRANSITION TO KINDERGARTEN

Preparing Children for Kindergarten

210 children transitioned to Kindergarten in May 2014 Transition meetings are held in April of every year to assist parents of children who are moving on to kindergarten. A tour of the local public school is scheduled to familiarize the families of the setting and routines; parents are given opportunities to ask questions of kindergarten teachers. Lunch and other activities are available for the children and their parents. Transition packet will contain all health, developmental and educational information on each child for the appropriate school.

Collaboration Agreements

Gaston Community Action, Inc. collaborates with two LEA's (Gaston and Lincoln) in our service area. These agreements are with mental health, coordinating disabilities services, transition services and resource sharing.

COMMUNITY SERVICE BLOCK GRANT Brenda Smith, Director

In collaboration with our partners, GCA works to improve the social and economic well being of individuals and families in the counties we serve, Gaston, Lincoln, Cleveland and Stanly in North Carolina. We are tasked by the State to aid in the reduction of citizens who are living in poverty.

Through the Community Services Block Grant, we operate the Total Family Achievement Program (TFAP) which provides essential human services to help citizens to self sufficiency. The TFAP assists individuals and families obtain employment and standard housing, with education/training, and emergency needs related to self-sufficiency.

The number of families enrolled from July of 2013 through June of 2014 was 151, a total of 379 family members.

WEATHERIZATION and HARRP

Kay McCathen, Director

The Weatherization Assistance Program helps low-income families save energy and reduce utility bills. Gaston Community Action provides families in Gaston, Mecklenburg, Stanly and Union counties with incomes at or below 200 percent of the poverty income level with weatherization services. Families with incomes at or below 150 percent of the poverty level may receive Heating, Air Repair/Replacement (HARRP) services.

The Weatherization Assistance Program is administered through the North Carolina Energy Office in the N.C. Department of Commerce.

The mission of weatherization is to improve energy efficiency, household safety and to educate families on how to maintain energy efficiency. The focus of the program is on the elderly, the disabled, families with children, high energy users and the energy burdened.

The goal of the program is to keep citizens warm in the winter, cool in the summer, and safe all year long. Weatherization is available for single-family homes, apartments, condominiums, and mobile homes. Some of the measures that may be addressed by weatherization are: Client education, Evaluation of homes for health and safety, ECT's, repairs or replaces heating systems as needed, Insulates attics, floors and walls as needed, minor repairs for health and safety reasons, Installs smoke and carbon monoxide detectors, performs base load and general heat waste measures.
